
Q: Liberal leader Michael Ignatieff has claimed he would NOT participate in a coalition. Do you believe him?




This online poll by Leger Marketing was done March 26-27 with a representative sample of 1,119 Canadians. Results are considered accurate +/-3.1%, 19 times out of 20.

Fundamental questions to be answered

- Who we are – as individuals and collectively”
- What do we think and believe?
- What are our priorities and expectations?

How we learn about who we are

- From people we know – friends, family, colleagues
- From media – traditional and social
- From art and literature
- From advertising and marketing
- From social science & survey research

Why survey research is important

- Expands the dialogue to all segments of society, especially those not usually heard from
- Provides an essential check on how elites and media define public opinion
- Identifies myths and misperceptions that call for attention
- Provides the basis for understanding and empathy – what it's like to be someone else



Groundbreaking Study of Aboriginal Canadians



2013 Trudeau Foundation Survey - Methodology

- Telephone survey – representative sample of 1,503 Canadians (18+)
- Conducted September 17 – October 13, 2013
- Stratified to ensure representation by age, gender, province and community size
- Margin of sampling error: + / - 2.5% (19 in 20 samples)






Who is most in need of more government assistance?




A guaranteed annual income for all Canadians, to replace current assistance programs

By household income




Should Aboriginal Peoples have self-government?

1990 – 2013




Should Aboriginal Peoples have self-government?

1990 – 2013 By province




Preferred form of Aboriginal self-government




Extent of society's discrimination against minority groups


By income and country of origin



Canada's record on human rights vs. other western democracies




Frequency of discrimination against minority groups




Groups often subject to discrimination



Who is most responsible for economic and social inequality among minority groups?








Most important problem facing Canada today

Most important problem facing Canada today*





Belief in the reality of climate change*




Most important problem facing Canada in future if not addressed

By province




How much do environmental problems affect your own health?

1992 - 2013





“A great deal” by household income 2011 – 2013




Most serious environmental hazards to public health


Unprompted responses – Top mentions



Potential risks to health of Canadians




Potential risks to health of Canadians










Canada's participation in military action to restore peace in a small African country




Canada's most positive contribution to the world*

1993 – 2012 Top mentions



What this research tells us

- A clear sense of collective responsibility for those who are vulnerable and in need of assistance
- An increasing acknowledgement of the challenges and aspirations of Aboriginal Peoples
- Human rights protections are not a widespread concern, but most are mindful of ongoing discrimination against certain minorities
- Some do blame the victim, and bigotry is still present among us

What this research tells us

- Environmental issues are not a pressing public concern – for many it remains more symbolic than concrete
- But issues like climate change are broadly acknowledged to be critical priorities for the future
- Canadians want their country to be a force of good in the world, and send the troops if necessary
- We don't divide the world into friends and enemies
